The Christmas Jumper Party was enjoyed by everyone who was able to attend and I extend grateful thanks to the many Rotarians who contributed to our enjoyment. We were all disappointed not to be able to fulfil our usual Christmas fund raising activities. The Christmas Planning Group will be reporting back in the coming weeks on what we were able to achieve. From a financial point of view the Virtual Santa didn't get as much response as we had hoped but it was a real joy to experience the children's reactions and feedback from parents.

In recent weeks I have been working on a joint project with Rtn Giles Bloomer of Rotherham Rotary on a bid to South Yorkshire Community Fund to support foodbanks in Rotherham. I 'm pleased to report that we have been successful and have received £5,000 to support their work. You may be surprised to learn that there are 14 foodbanks around the Borough but grants can only be given to those who had not previously benefitted. As a result the grant has been shared by just 5 giving them an incredible boost to see them through the winter months. The beneficiaries are Full Life Church in Maltby, Harthill/Thorp Salvin, Liberty Church Masborough, Rotherham Foodbank and Rotherham Salvation Army. Two of the above asked only for £500 of their share so the remaining £1,000 has been granted to the Social Supermarket run by Rotherham Minster. This is an innovative project and it would be good to hear more details from Phil Batchford Vicar of Rotherham at a Speaker meeting.

Later in the Bulletin you will see a breakdown of all donations given to Rotherham Foodbank during 2020.

The annual Awards Night at Wickersley School will be broadcast on Thursday 7<sup>th</sup> January 2021. I am very disappointed not to be there in person but have sent a video with my greetings and congratulations. I have a particular affinity to that school as I started my teaching career in the original stone building when it was still Wickersley Secondary Modern. I'll let you do the maths!

At our January Fellowship meeting will hear back from the students we sponsored to attend the International Peace Jam. Later we will be regaled by the reprobates in our midst with tales of their antics in days of yore, usually on International trips. Be prepared to be shocked!

We continue to save starfish

#### Rotherham on Film.

One of the main impacts of the lockdown has been the time I've spent watching BBC iPlayer and different films on a range of other platforms. One of these platforms is BFI player (<a href="https://player.bfi.org.uk/">https://player.bfi.org.uk/</a>). This has films you can watch if you pay the subscription or films you pay a rental fee to watch. What really marks out BFI player's uniqueness is its collection of archive films which everyone can watch for free just by registering.

Once you are on the site and registered just go to the search facility. If you enter "Rotherham" you will find about a dozen archive films that you can watch on your device. Some of the films date from the early 1900s such as workers coming out of Parkgate Iron and Steel Company in 1901. It's

There's a fascinating film from 1961 which shows what a wonderful job Rotherham Corporation does for its citizens. The voiceover sounds suspiciously like John Box and the film shows a number of fascinating views of the town and its surrounding areas in the early 1960s. Sequences include Broom Valley primary (presumably before young Rotarian Phil Crutchley's time there); Home Help; fire engines going through the streets of Rotherham; road mending along Herringthorpe Valley Road; Civil Defence volunteers; the former-former library and the "recently opened" Civic Theatre. Once or twice the language jars such as the reference to "activities for the mentally subnormal", but there is a treasure-load of images in this 39 minute film.

There's another film about steelworkers, this time from 1969, which shows young employees taking part in activities to gain their Duke of Edinburgh Award. Rotarian Joe Walker will be intrigued to see Crookestone Barn featured for some of this 23 minutes film. The outside is clearly recognisable – as is the weather.

The fascination in watching the films isn't just seeing familiar and forgotten places, long bus queues, numerous men wearing ties and "trackless" trolleys making their way to Maltby in the 1930s. Another key interest is to consider how these films would initially have been viewed: whereas we can start and stop them at any point we choose, viewers of that time would have had to make arrangements to go and see them along with others (no Lockdown then). We can also consider who paid for them to be produced - and why.

interesting to see that giving a "V" sign to a camera was already popular by this time! Although I am not really sure, I think I recognise two current Rotherham Sitwell Rotarians having a scrap and another one riding a bike.



Let me know if any of the films you see, spark a memory or story and perhaps we can try a Zoom meeting soon sharing experiences NB the films can't be saved onto your device but are currently always accessible on-line. If you want to share them, send this link to whoever you want to watch it.

### A Thank You from Kids Out received by email and forwarded by Phil Crutchley

Dear Rtn Phil,

On behalf of us all at KidsOut, I would like to say a huge thank you to you and your Rotary Club for the £300 donation, to go towards the Rotary Christmas Toy Box Initiative 'Every Refuge, Every Child'. This is a wonderful contribution and I would ask you to pass on our sincere thanks to all involved for their generosity and support. The Toy Boxes will be distributed and delivered to the Refuge by the end of this week. The refuge staff have been asked to give the Toy Boxes to the mothers nearer to Christmas Day.

As you can imagine, Christmas is always tough for families in refuge, with this year set to be harder than usual. Most children arrive at refuge with only the clothes on their back, restricted to a single room with their mother and siblings. Mothers struggle to provide basic essentials, let alone toys for their children at Christmas. With 78% of families in refuge with no access to a TV, you can only imagine the difference these toys will make. As an aside, KidsOut has also provided 1300 families who have no access to a food bank or the school voucher scheme

with a £25 supermarket voucher for Christmas. We have also sent out 7500 goodie bags for disadvantaged children.

The Rotary Christmas Toy Boxes will provide children in refuge with brandnew toys to support mental health and make the world a little kinder. The toys are given to the mother so that she can provide the toys from Santa and not from charity. This is so important for the mother's self-esteem at such a distressing time.

"Refuge life can be difficult, especially for families, and the added pressure for parents to ensure their children have presents to open on Christmas morning causes a lot of stress and upset for our mums – especially if finances are tight. However, your toys mean we can provide our amazing families with the opportunity to have a lovely Christmas Day... please know your toys will be put towards making a child smile this Christmas." – Refuge support worker

KidsOut is a Rotary charity, started by Rotary and run by Rotarians – our aim is to bring a bit of fun and happiness into the lives of disadvantaged children and we believe every child deserves to build happy memories.

Thank you once again – your support has made a real difference to some of the most disadvantaged children in your local area, bringing some joy when they need it most.




